Artist Biographies

Rachael Alexandra is a professional dancer, choreographer, and teacher based in the DMV area. She is currently a company member of Uprooted Dance and has performed for various choreographers, including Alvin Mayes, Erica Rebollar, Sylvana Christopher, and Sinclair Emoghene. Rachael has also choreographed dance works to be performed at the Atlas Performing Arts Center and Dance Loft on 14. Her own works include Songs My Mother Taught Me (2019), #GirlBoss (2021), and Choose Your Own Adventure (2022). Rachael has a B.A. in dance from James Madison University and is currently working toward her M.F.A in dance at Hollins University. Aside from dancing, she is a special educator at the Ivymount School and a dance teacher at Imagination Stage.

Covenant Babatunde is a DMV choreographer, dancer, and actor who has presented work at several venues in the East Coast. She's recently presented work in concerts hosted by Glade Dance Collective, Light Switch Dance Theater, and performed as Stepsister in Synetic Theater's Cinderella. Covenant has a BA in Creative Writing and a minor in Musical Theatre from the University of Mary Washington. Her strong background in writing has greatly influenced her as an artist - with her focal point always being the creation of well-rounded characters and thought-provoking stories. <u>Celine Berthaud</u> began her formal dance training at the OrigiNation Cultural Arts Center at the tender age of 12 and continued to further her training at the Boston Arts Academy where she graduated as a Dance major. She has received the professional advancement in dance award from The School at Jacob's Pillow, participating in their first Hip Hop Continuum Program. She has studies at The Ailey School, Earl Mosley's Institute of the Arts, and the Contemporary Masters Series at Steps on Broadway. Celine has trained with artists such as Ronald K. Ms. Blackwell is well versed in teaching all levels of ballet, modern, theater dance, hip-hop, jazz, contemporary ballet, and West African; also Beg/intermediate tap.

Ms. Blackwell continues to use her gifts to inspire the next generation as the dance education teacher at EL Haynes Public Charter School in Washington, DC and as Artistic Director of Inspired Collective Dance Theater; Making sure that every student feels welcome, confident, and encouraged, three things that make up a healthy, positive and secure learning environment.

Since relocating to the Washington, DC area, Sara joined Moveius Contemporary Ballet in 2016, and has also performed professionally with Olney Ballet Theatre and with Nancy Flores. Aside from dancing, Sara holds a BFA in Fine Art Photography from Rochester Institute of Technology. In her spare time, Sara enjoys spending time with her husband, Trevor, and their two dogs, Lula Mae and Milo, as well as participating in competitive yoga.

Adam Chavis is a North Carolina native and started his ballet training at age 7 under Charlotte Blume in Fayetteville, NC. She studied Afro-Cuban, Ballet, Capoeira, Contact Improv, Modern, Improv, Dance & Technology, and Labanotation. She conducted dance research in Cuba, Puerto Rico, France and Senegal. Christopher performed her choreography at The National Museum of African Arts, The Museum of the Americas and The Phillips Collection. She has created work With Glade Dance Collective, which she co-founded in 2009, she built repertoire and performed outreach. Christopher is teaching artist for Inspired Child and Dance Loft on 14 and committed to racial equity in dance and accessible interdisciplinary performances.

SYDC combined release and traditional modern techniques, interweaving a love of dance and storytelling. She currently works as a hospice chaplain for BridgingLife Hospice and Palliative Care. In addition to her choreographic work, Donham has also performed for Eclipse Dance Theater, Khadra International Dance Theater, Right Brain Performancelab, Jenice Acosta Movers, and in the work of Apryl Renee, Marisa Pugliano, Jen Minore, and Joe Landini.

<u>Virginia Driggers'</u> dance education began at the age of 8 in the genres of Ballet, Pointe, Lyrical, Contemporary, Jazz, Tap, and Hip Hop. She went on to dance in events such as the DC Cherry Blossom Parade, and college bowl halftime shows as a back up performer for artists, Jake Owens and Nico&Vinz. She also choreographed for numerous high school choral and musical theatre productions. She graduated from James Madison University in 2020 with a BA in Dance. Since graduating she has began teaching a variety of dance styles at Dance Etc. School of the Arts in Woodbridge, VA. She has also choreographed for PWC events. This research resulted in the evening-length show Spacetime Suite, funded by a 2016 Dance Metro DC Presentation Grant.

Sopoci Drake is the Artistic Director of Spacetime Dance and a founding collaborator of the Mountain Empire Performance Collective. Her choreography has been performed by Momentum Dance Company, Wild Space Dance Company, The Florentine Opera, Lawrence University Opera, and many more. Her long-distance improvisation-based collaborations with Mountain Empire Performance Collective have been performed from New York to Oregon. As a performer, Sopoci Drake is described as a "sinuous, animal presence of great power" (Third Coast Digest, 6/12). She has had a national performing career with Spacetime Dance, Mountain Empire Performance Collective, RebollarDance, Mordine and Company Dance Theater, Momentum Dance Company, Wild Space Dance Company, and Rosy Simas Danse. Spacetime Dance's 2019 and 2020 seasons have been funded by grants from the DC Commission on the Arts and Humanities Fellowship Program.

<u>Kamillia McCracken</u> was raised in Richland, WA where she began her dance training with the Mid-Columbia Ballet under Debra Rogo. She had the pleasure of being a participant of Regional Dance America in the Pacific region where she was able to work with Kiyon Gains, Ashley Walton, Eva Stone, and Nicholas Ade. Outside of MCB, Kamillia supplemented her training and received various scholarships from programs including Pacific Northwest Ballet, Sacramento Ballet, Colorado Conservatory of Dance, and Alonzo King Lines Ballet. In Fall of 2019, Brittney studied with FSU, in the Arts in NYC program, working an internship with Town Stages and taking full-time academic classes in New York City. Currently, Brittney is dancing with Revision Dance Company, UpRooted Dance Company and Next Reflex Dance Collective on their current projects.

Her work has been showcased in productions at various local DC area venues including Dance Place, Joy of Motion, The Workhouse Arts Center, John F. Kennedy Center, and the Harman Shakespeare Theater. Her work has taken her to music festivals in WVA and PA and has created various collaborating productions through Next Reflex Dance Collective presenting artists through *en Route, A Touring Dance Project* and *The Winter Music and Dance Festival*. Ms. Morgan Rowley currently teaches for University of Mary Washington and George Mason University.

<u>Carrie Monger</u> received a Minor in Dance from James Madison University and a Masters in Counseling from the College of William and Mary. She has been dancing professionally in the Metro DC area since 2001. She has performed extensively, both nationally and internationally with a variety of choreographers including David Dorfman, Israeli choreographer Amir Kolben, Jane Franklin, Deborah Riley and Kelly Bond. She is currently a member and Assistant Director of UpRooted Dance. Carrie has choreographed and collaborated with other performing arts companies and visual artists in the area. <u>Alexander Short</u> has been dancing in the DC area for a really long time and has worked with many local choreographers. He has worked with Malcolm Shute and Human Landscape Dance since 2006 performing in a wide variety of places. Their most recent international performances include the Contact Dance International Film Festival in Toronto, Canada, and Attune in Kyoto, Japan. More recently he has performed with Human Landscape Dance at the Exchange Choreography Festival in Tulsa, OK and Inhale at the CHI Movement Arts Center in Philadelphia. Alex is a Certified Movement Analyst.

Rachel Snow Ms. Snow began her dance training at the age of 3 and eventually graduated from Virginia Ballet Company (VBC) in 2012. At VBC she performed in Giselle, The Firebird, Les Sylphides, Coppelia, Swan Lake, Sleeping Beauty, Cinderella, and The Nutcracker. She also had the honor to perform with VBC at The National Theatre, with the United States Air Force Band at Constitution Hall, and at the International Children's Festival at Wolf Trap National Park.

Ms. Snow went on to study classical ballet, jazz, and modern Graham technique at Point Park University. In 2016 she graduated from BYU-Hawaii, where she performed contemporary, Hula, Maori, Samoan, and other Polynesian dance on the North Shore of Oahu.

Ms. Snow joined the contemporary dance group Nomadic Artist and the instructing staff at VBC in 2017. She has directed VBC's contemporary summer concert - Precedence - several times, as well as choreographing pieces: Senso di Colpa, Zodiac, Quiet is Violent, Everybody, The Clique, and Beneath Contempt. Ms. Snow currently teaches hip-hop and flamenco at the Rhythm and Arts Center of Virginia.

Malcolm Shute founded Human Landscape Dance in 2006, and has since brought contact choreography around the world. Working with artist partners, he has given performances, held workshops, and shot video footage in Europe, Asia, and South America, as well as cities across the US and Canada. Noted for "...ingenious choreography and staging..." by the Washington Post, Shute's dances are characterized by intimate portraits of people experiencing fundamental shifts in their lives and relationships: growing together, growing apart. Dancers use touch to communicate, bodies molding together in successive waves to create a pastiche of experience. Dance videos directed by Shute have twice been honored in the Gala Showing at the Contact Dance International Film Festival. Shute has led workshops in contact improvisation and Laban Movement Analysis in many nations.

Shute holds a MFA in Dance with a Concentration in Choreography from the University of Maryland. He is Certified as a Movement Analyst by the Laban/Bartenieff Institute of Movement Studies. He holds Bachelor's degrees in Dance and English from the University of Massachusetts. Shute has taught in the Dance Department at Towson University for 20 years. In addition to composition and contemporary technique, his academic offerings include colonialism, mythology, and Body Studies. He initiated online courses for the Dance Department. Shute is a faculty member in the department's Master of Arts in Dance Education program. He has often choreographed for the Towson student dance company, and for faculty performances.

<u>Victoria Unterberger</u> has over 20 years of dance experience that began at Dance Etc. School of the Arts in Northern Virginia. Her initial dance background was in contemporary, ballet, tap and jazz. Prior to college Tori performed at the Orange Bowl, Sugar Bowl, Russell Athletic Bowl, and Holiday Bowl halftimes having the opportunity to work with Bonny Story, Mandy Moore, and Chris Judd. A highlight was being a Cappy Dancer performing at the Kennedy Center at 16. She is a BFA Dance performance graduate from Radford University with minors in Theater and Business Administration studying directly under dana bella, Amy VanKirk, Inessa and Aleksey Plekhanova, Wesley Young, and Jieun Lee. She graduated with honors and summa cum laude, running student organizations and large benefit concerts during her time in undergrad. During college she participated in dance intensives with Christopher K. Morgan & Artist and was selected for New York City's STEPS on Broadway Summer Intensive under Mindy

Jackson. Her main focus in dance then transitioned to modern, jazz, and choreography while maintaining her ballet studies. She has choreographed over 10 original works, directed an hour length one act, multiple scenes and is still creating work. 
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
